# Last month at a glance

Conditions got extremely wet during July but luckily the sanctuary did not suffer any serious damage. The lake level did rise to a very high level due to the outlet stream becoming partially blocked by a slip just below the water gate. Thankfully this has partly cleared itself. Ground conditions have been far too wet to get machinery close enough to attend to it.

The wet conditions have resulted in a greater number of tree falls through the sanctuary resulting in more hours spent clearing these.

The Taranaki rescue helicopter made a visit to the lake, mid month, to attend to a member of the public who suffered a broken leg while walking the lake walkway. Ranger Lance was called out to assist getting the patient from the far side of the lake to the car park with the use of the sanctuary's quad bike.

The mid year high risk area tracking card run was conducted late in the month. Two cards from the area adjacent to the first car park produced mouse prints. One mouse was caught in the immediate area the day after the cards were collected. Hopefully there are no more.

An enthusiastic team from Ballance Agri-Nutrients spent 2 days rebuilding and widening an old section of the lake walkway boardwalk in the vicinity of bush ridge. Thanks guys for a job well done.

Following the precision placement of gravel stocks by helicopter a significant part of the Ridge track has been re-metalled making it much safer when its wet.

#### Volunteer of the Month


#### Graham Wells
